"The grace of God means something like: Here is your life. You might never have been, but you are because the party wouldn't have been complete without you." – Frederick Buechner

The wonderful writer, Presbyterian minister, and theologian Frederick Buechner died two weeks ago at his home in Rupert. He was influential to many of us because of his ability to take ideas, scripture and every day lived experiences and make them sacred in their ordinariness. I often find myself reading his take on concepts as broad as gluttony or as specific as the Messiah. A good chunk of his work was autobiographical, but he also wrote novels. I was fortunate to get to hear him speak and do a reading from one of his books about a dozen years ago at the Northshire Bookstore and he turned out to be just as witty and wise in person as he was on the page. One of his most famous quotes that I heard from multiple professors in seminary was, "Your calling is where your own greatest joy intersects with the needs of the world."

Buechner's influence will continue and raises the question of what draws us to certain writers and speakers more than others. Is it because when we experience their words, we learn something new about the world or ourselves? Are we drawn to those who reinforce our own world view or at the very least give voice to the ideas we have within us that we have trouble putting into words ourselves? Do that person's words get at some deep need within us and hearing them makes us feel less alone in the world?

As we move into the glory and beauty that is autumn in Vermont, may these words of Fred Buechner about imagination stir something within you:

"EVEN A THOUSAND MILES inland you can smell the sea and hear the mewing of gulls if you give thought to it. You can see in your mind's eye the living faces of people long dead or hear in the mind's ear the United States Marine Band playing "The Stars and Stripes Forever." If you work at it, you can smell the smell of autumn leaves burning or taste a chocolate malted. You don't have to be asleep to dream dreams either. There are those who can come up with dramas laid twenty thousand leagues under the sea or take a little girl through a looking glass. Imagining is perhaps as close as humans get to creating something out of nothing the way God is said to. It is a power that to one degree or another everybody has or can develop, like whistling. Like muscles, it can be strengthened through practice and exercise. Keep at it until you can actually hear your grandfather's voice, for instance, or feel the rush of hot air when you open the 450-degree oven...When Jesus said, "All ye that labor and are heavy laden," he was seeing the rich as well as the poor, the lucky as well as the unlucky, the idle as well as the industrious. He was seeing the bride on her wedding day. He was seeing the old man in front of the TV. He was seeing all of us. The highest work of the imagination is to have eyes like that." (from Whistling in the Dark)

May you and your imagination grow during this season of changing colors.

# Pastoral Search Committee Report

The pastor search committee has met twice so far. As you know, Karen Tibbetts, Karen Underhill, Donna Stone, Christy Wood, and me are serving. At our first meeting, the committee elected me as chair. We also discussed general philosophy and reviewed the handbook on selecting ministers prepared by the United Church of Christ. At our next meeting, we met with the Rev. Paul Sangree from the UCC. Paul will be our liaison.

In the coming weeks, the search committee will be inviting members of the congregation to a focus group. Each focus group will consist of 6-8 people, plus two search committee members for each group.

Discussion topics would be how do we experience God, how do we define our church, who is our church helping, what's our mission, who among the unchurched are we hoping to reach, and whatever issues come up relevant to how we see our future.

The Karens, Donna, and I each agreed to host a focus group. Everyone will be getting an invitation. We'll organize these for September and October. Paul said these would have to happen before January I to be on schedule. We'd like to do these in the early fall, however.

We will also interview 3 or 4 community leaders who are not church members on what they think our profile is in the community. We selected Jean Freebern, Don Keelan, Sarah Pickering, and Natalie Caler. These people will be asked to write letters of recommendation on behalf of our church.

These two projects are essential in preparing a profile of the Federated Church and a job description prospective applicants will get. They'll want lots of information on us, as we want to know a great deal about them. In the fall, we need to focus on photography as this is an important part of the profile.

Our next meeting is on September 7. We will have scheduled our community leader meetings and selected our focus group invitees by that time.

To recap, the church council decided early this summer to go through the United Church of Christ rather than the United Methodist Church. I'm a Methodist and support this wholeheartedly. The UCC gives us maximum flexibility in hiring who we want. The UMC will want to try to send us a minister, matching our profile who the Vermont office feels are suitable Methodist ministers. This diminishes our autonomy.

The UCC will facilitate all candidates who are ordained. A minister from any Protestant denomination can apply. Candidates will need eventually to get a denominational ok but no one is going to block us from hiring a candidate we want who wants us.

# Spirit-Led Action

Center for Action and Contemplation teacher Brian McLaren shares the power of ongoing discernment, allowing ourselves to be ever drawn by the Holy Spirit into service and action on behalf of others:

The Spirit leads us downward. To the bottom, to the place of humility, to the position and posture of service . . . that's where the Spirit, like water, flows. . . .

If you listen to the Spirit, here is what will happen to you. You'll be at a party and you'll notice on one side of the room all the beautiful people laughing and having fun together. In a far corner, you'll notice a person who is alone, feeling awkward, not knowing anyone. The Spirit will draw you to the person in need. You may become the bridge that connects the outsider to the insiders—and in that connection, both will be better off. . . .

Here's what will happen to you if you listen to the Spirit. You will realize that someone is angry at you or resentful toward you . . . or worked behind your back to do you harm. Everything in you will want you to write them off or get them back. But the Spirit will draw you toward them in humility. . . . Here's what will happen if you listen to the Spirit. You will see a person or a group being vilified or scapegoated. Everyone is blaming them, shaming them, gossiping about them, feeling superior to them, venting their anxieties on them. . . . But the Spirit will draw you to differ courageously and graciously. . . . You will risk your reputation in defending the person or people being scapegoated. And in that risk, both you and they will know that God's Spirit is alive and at work in your midst.

If you listen to the Spirit, here's what will happen to you. It will be late. You will be tired. There will be dishes to do or clothes to pick up or trash to empty. *Someone else should have done this*, you will think with anger. You will rehearse in your mind the speech you will give them. And then you will think, *But I guess they're just as tired and overworked as I am. So maybe I can help.* You won't do this as a manipulative ploy but as a simple act of service. . . .

There is a prison near you. A hospital. A park or a bridge or an alley where homeless people sleep. . . . There's a country in great need or a social problem that few people notice. If you listen to the Spirit, you will be drawn toward an opportunity to serve. At first, the thought will frighten or repel you. But when you let the Spirit guide you, it will be a source of great joy—one of the richest blessings of your life.
