"For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven:"

After approximately 175 of these newsletter reflections over the past 16 years, this is the final one that I will be sharing with all of you. Looking back, some of them have been very "news of the day" in their specificity while many have reflected some thought or idea or concern that grabbed my attention. Just this morning I was reading an article by a Mennonite pastor in North Carolina who summed up pastoral ministry quite succinctly. She indicated that her job "is to pay attention for a living."

Paying attention – to the wider world and then zooming in on issues and concerns with more and more of a focus on national then state then local community and ultimately paying attention to individual people. That's what we do as church. We are inextricably linked to each other and our attention, can at times, feel like it is being pulled in a dozen different directions and then the critical issue becomes discerning which person or activity or even object needs our attention most at that time.

Being a person of gratitude is the message that wants the attention of my head and my heart as the countdown of my final days as your pastor is progressing with amazing speed. Tis the season for giving thanks. First and always foremost, there is gratitude to our ever-present God with whom we have been in a three-way covenant since I was called on that lovely August Sunday in 2007. God's presence throughout our time together has been felt more strongly on some days than others but the knowledge of being held in love by the strength and light and power that is the Divine has made even the saddest and hardest of days bearable.

We, you the congregation and me the pastor, are the other two parts of the covenant and I want to express the deepest of thanksgiving for calling me and loving me while we have been church together all these years. In both remarkable and everyday ways, you have embodied what it means to be Christ to one another and the world. This community is so blessed to have all of you continually acting on your faith.

I hope I have the chance to speak with as many of you as possible before my final day, September 27. I offer then this Irish blessing to the future:

May your mornings bring joy and your evenings bring peace. May your troubles grow few as your blessings increase. May the saddest day of your future be no worse than the happiest day of your past. May your hands be forever clasped in friendship and your hearts joined forever in love. Your lives are very special, and God has touched you in many ways. May his blessings rest upon you and fill all your coming days.

Divine intervention delivered to us our new pastor. On August 27th, the congregation of the Federated Church of East Arlington called Andris Berry as our minister, succeeding Kathy Clark and starting on September 17th. Andris will overlap with our esteemed Kathy for two weeks and take the reins with Jesus at his side on October 1st.

Andris comes to us via Hollywood, Astoria, Saint Louis, and the Northeast Kingdom so, like many ministers today, he's here circuitously. His father, the Rev. Dr. Steve Berry, is the pastor at the Rupert church. Andris was a Teamster truck driver for Hollywood studios but, over time, moved toward the work of God, came back to Vermont, and enrolled in the intensive pastor preparation program run by the United Church of Christ. The program develops men and women to pastor small churches, and I emphasize "pastor." He'll care for us, teach us, and lead us.

Donna Stone, Karen Tibbetts, Karen Underhill, and Christy Wood joined me on the search committee. We read Andris's application, met him, attended a worship service he led and were nudged by the Holy Spirit. We worked together for a year with not a cross word, focused as we were on continuing and expanding the church's work, now in its 191st year. We were conscious of past, present, and future.

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Beauty Despite Bigotry

When Pharoah calls you in and asks, "What is your occupation?" you should answer, "Your servants have tended livestock from our boyhood on, just as our fathers did." Then you will be allowed to settle in the region of Goshen, for all shepherds are detestable to the Egyptians. - Genesis 46:33-34 (NIV) After revealing himself as kin to his ten Hebrew brothers, Joseph the Prince of Egypt invites his entire family to come live with him in Egypt and thereby escape the famine that has plagued the Middle East. Before presenting his family to the Pharaoh for final approval, Joseph cautions them to tell the Pharaoh that they are all herdsmen—tenders of livestock.

Joseph knows that when the Pharaoh hears of his family's occupation, he will assign them a territory called Goshen, located in the northeast region of the Nile Delta. The territory is in Egypt, yet separate from the Egyptians; Joseph is aware that many Egyptians consider Hebrew herdsmen to be uncouth, uncultured, and of lower caste than Egyptian city dwellers.

But in their separate, segregated region, the Hebrews flourish. So much so that by the time a new Pharaoh came to power in Egypt, he notices that the Hebrews in segregated Goshen had outnumbered and become more powerful than the Egyptians.

Scripture tells us that the more the new Pharaoh sought to suppress the Hebrews, the more they multiplied.

Black Americans have had to deal with bigotry in America historically and systemically. But American bigotry has not been able to stifle the creativity, the resiliency, and the vibrancy of Black American life.

Listen to our music. Taste our food. Experience our worship. Enter our ethos.

Beauty has thrived despite bigotry in Native American artistry, in LGBTQ pageantry, and in countless "China Towns" across the country.

It was Joseph who declared that what was meant for evil, God used for good.
